f you're not a musician, it's hard to explain just how it feels to find the right people to form a band. It's not quite like needing a group of workers. Because it's not just a job to be filled. Every prospective band member brings a talent and a sound that can shape the direction of the band itself. And when you have everybody you want, just how you want them, nothing beats it.

Sly Fox and the Hustlers are a stellar lineup, and their journey in music is an actual journey through the highways and byways. And sometimes they come back home for a little something.

I talk with Sly Fox for a breakfast chat.

RRX: Sly Fox and the Hustlers started with tough times. Namely, your

tough times, and your decision to write them out. When you were going through it, when you were writing, were you trying to write songs specifically? And if so, is it any different to write songs now in, presumably, better times?

SF: When I was first inspired to write the songs that became the basis for the band and first CD I was still kind of in the middle of going through some hard times and it pushed me to write down lyrics. The lyrics came with melodies that I turned into songs. Writing now in better times by comparison I find myself inspired on a regular basis to write about things that are important to me. I say it's still a pretty good mix of storytelling, some based

on myself and some based on things I see around me in the world.

RRX: Another step toward the formation of the band was Dylan Storm; namely, his finding the bass. His sound on that instrument is what really backs up the sound. And Dylan wasn't a bass player to start out. Do you think other bands in history could've benefitted from their players switching up?

SF: Yes, Dylan is definitely a big part of the sound, we had been friends and jamming together before the band got started. He was in another band playing guitar and singing and when that band split up it freed up Dylan at the same time I needed a bass player. So, it was a natural progression to slide

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him into the lineup. He's a great talent, proficient on many instruments and a great voice. I definitely think any band or musician can benefit by switching up instruments the more you understand music overall and how all the parts are related via the different instruments of the band it gives you the big picture over view rather than just coming at it from just one angle. I also think it's important to sing, even if it's just a bit to have a full grasp on melody

RRX: With drummer Sean Ireland, all the pieces were in place. Sly Fox and the Hustlers were born. Whenever this happens, it's a thing worthy of celebration. Do you remember what you did to celebrate the moment you realized that you all had it? Did you celebrate at all, or did you tuck your heads down to do the work right away?

SF: Once Sean was on board he really

RRX: Your music has an interesting mix. You got blues and funk and soul with a hard edge to it, something you don't always hear. And did you have a tough time figuring out things like the best venues to shoot for?

SF: Yes, I am not big on categoriz-

to make something that's creative and has substance. I dialed down from the battling and focused... the past three to four years I've just been in the studio. I wouldn't say I'm done though.

RRX: You said you're in your thirties, so you probably grew up listening to mid-nineties rap?

RM: Yeah and unfortunately, one of my favorite rappers who was in my top five- DMX just passed. Rest in peace, he was an inspiration as far as his storytelling and his aggressiveness. RRX: I hear you there. Now your slogan is "Money and Music".

Back in 2010 I came up with MoneyNMusic as far as an entertainment company. And about five vears ago I made it official and got my LLC. Anything from music to clothing is all under the MoneyNMusic umbrella.

RRX: What's more important money or music?

RM: I think they go hand in hand but money pays the bills. > **RRX:** There's just so many artists I listen to in my own time that I can never play. I'd get fired!

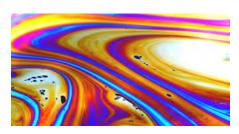

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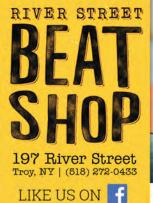
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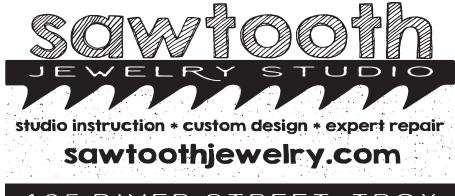






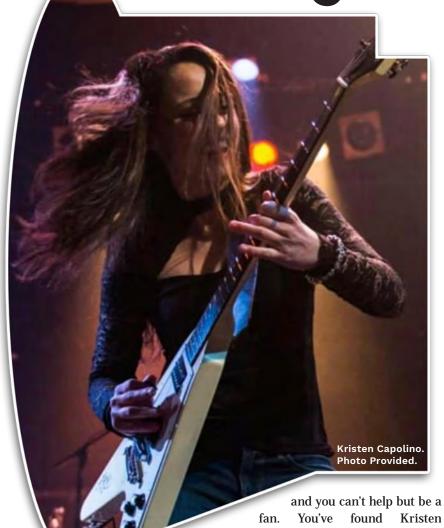






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The Stage is the Best Love

ome musicians have so much energy and stage presence that you don't mind if they're not the best. And some musicians are so good that you don't care if the just stand there on stage. But once in a while you get someone who has boundless energy and stage presence, and the absolute talent on their instrument to back it all up,

Kristen Capolino is beyond an upand-comer. This singer, songwriter, and guitarist brings it with everything she does, and she reflects the pure love of music every time she smiles onstage, which is every time she's on stage.

I sit with Kristen and we talk about string mishaps.

RRX: You have an explosive amount of energy on stage. It's really infectious, and that's from sitting here on the computer watching you play on YouTube. It's amazing. I imagine it's something people expect of your shows. Is it, then, tougher,

still have a show to play? Where do you pull the reserves from?

KC: There have definitely been over the other? times when I've had to do shows when I was really tired or even sick, but the power of connecting with an audience during a show really is amazing! I remember when I was a kid, I was watching an interview with Albert Collins, and he talked about how performing "gets rid of all that tiredness you had". He was absolutely right! I just can't help but have a blast when I perform in front of a crowd and bring joy to people through music. Seeing the smile on people's faces makes me feel like I can do anything no matter how tired I might be. A few years ago, I got really sick, but I knew the show must go on. I felt so unwell that I loaded up on DavQuil before we started the show, and I started to wonder how I was going to get through the night. I got up there and had so much fun! I didn't feel sick at all, and we played for at least 2 hours! I was definitely feeling loopy from the DayQuil (laughs), but the energy of the crowd is truly what got me through. Music has the power to heal people, and it will give you energy even if you went a whole night without sleep! Who needs caffeine when you have rock and roll??

RRX: I see you playing a Flying V guitar a lot. Would you consider it your signature guitar? And since you do play other guitars, you probably have the right guitar on hand for whatever

when you're wiped out physically, but you occasion strikes. Can you tell us about a few of your guitars, their significance to you, or maybe why you would use one

> **KC:** I would definitely say that the Flying V is my signature guitar. My dad got me hooked on them at a young age when he had his black left-handed Gibson Flying V rebuilt for a small right-handed guitarist. It's adorable! When I'm at home writing and recording, I often play my Hamer Tele. I love how it has that single coil tone, but the neck feels so nice, and the scale length works for my small hands. As much as I love my V's, they're not very comfortable to play while sitting down. I also enjoy my red Gibson Les Paul Studio. He was the very first "real" guitar that my parents gave me when I was 10 years old so he will always be special. Another special guitar that I own is my PRS Al Di Meola Prism that Paul Reed Smith gave to me at NAMM 11 years ago. Such a gorgeous guitar! When I want to play outside on a beautiful day or work on some song writing, I often play my Taylor Doyle Dykes acoustic. It has such a beautiful tone, and the neck is very comfortable and thin, especially for an acoustic guitar. It's one the smoothest playing acoustics I have tried so far. I am currently on the hunt for a Hamer Stratocaster for when I need that jingly tone for my songs.

> **RRX:** I heard that you spend your time between Woodstock and Nashville. Those two places are both highly



meaningful from the perspective of music. Do you have different mindsets when you're in Woodstock versus Nashville? Obviously, Woodstock is home base, but is it more than that when you put a guitar in your hand?

KC: I will never forget the wonderful time I had working down in Nashville. I met and worked with such kind and talented people, and I'm thankful for the opportunity. I feel that working down there helped me mature as a songwriter and a singer especially. My producer, Kenny Greenberg, really helped me push the limits of my voice. During that time, I met my vocal coach, Diane Sheets, who has worked with some amazing bands and artists, such as Little Big Town and Natalie Grant. She definitely helped me sing with more confidence and style, and she's a sweetheart as well! I loved how going down there to work with top notch musicians made me push myself as an artist. As much as I loved working with these awesome people, I soon learned that the music industry wasn't quite what I thought. I really wanted to remain true to myself and have full control of my music so I started a series of concerts here in NY called Mondial. We often performed at Daryl's House in Pawling, which is such a beautiful venue. It's such a pleasure to work with professionals who make the process so easy and fun. For the Mondial Series we have a different special guest for each show, and the full concerts are all available through website. Kristencapolino.com. We've had some amazing guests so far, such as Bernie Marsden of Whitesnake and Billy Sheehan of Talas. I have to say I'm having such a blast doing these Mondial concerts as well as music videos of my new songs. I have Mike Sorrentino on drums, on the bass I have Ted Nugent's bassist, Greg Smith, and on rhythm guitar I have Desiree Bassett. I'm so thankful to be working with such killer players who are also wonderful people.

RRX: Everybody that has something to say about you says something about how genuine and heartfelt, how positive you are. When I listen to your songs, I hear someone who's tough, someone with an edge. Do you think it easier or harder to write tough, sharp-edged songs when you're such a heartfelt and positive person?

KC: Even though I'm usually an upbeat and positive person, I've always loved songs that are intense and emotional. When I was young, I would often listen to Empty Rooms by Gary Moore and cry. It's amazing how musicians like Gary can have such power over one's emotions through their music. I try to always keep my songs positive, but I enjoy writing songs where I can really dig in and play aggressively. It's definitely fun to have an alter ego while on stage.

RRX: You've gotten tons of accolades for your work. And it isn't just from the who's who of opinion makers. You have a lot of accolades from fans, and you've put them on your website alongside the professional accolades, which I think is cool. This question may be obvious, but how does it feel to get accolades from fans as opposed to "big names"?

KC: I There is nothing better than bringing joy to people through music. My favorite part of a show is getting to chat with fans and even meet new people afterwards. It makes me feel so good to inspire the younger generation especially. I recently connected with a guitar class from the West Humber C. I. school in Canada. These kids are just so kind and talented! I did a few Zoom calls with the students these last few months. and it was so much fun to answer their questions and connect with them. Each student sent me a beautiful thank you note and even put together a school project about me. I also love performing at the Westchester Allstars Christmas For Wounded Veterans concerts. It's just such an honor to perform for our

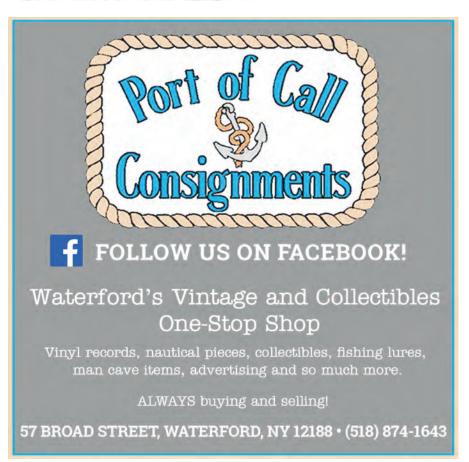
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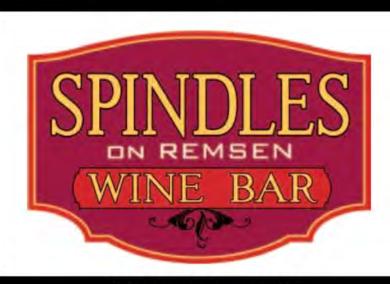
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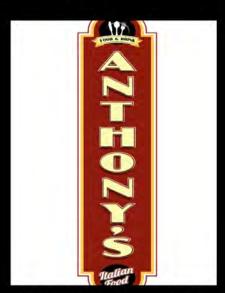
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When Fenway Comes Alive



ost of the time, musicians, and music, is very people-centered. You have front people with iconic looks and four chords to their name and they become gods. But music, real music, is everywhere. It narrates our lives better than the most seasoned author. And there's a whole world of music that we don't realize is music because we don't hear it but feel it.

Josh Kantor is in the not-so-silent service of making people feel, and he's doing it in the biggest way possible; as the organist at Fenway Park in Boston. He also happens to be the keyboardist for the super-group The Split Squad.

I sit down with Josh and we dine on peanuts and crackerjacks.

RRX: You are the organist for Fenway Park. You are a true unsung hero in that regard. In fact, you're really emblematic of the park in a way that nothing else is. You are Fenway to some people, when the Green Monster opens its mouth, you are its voice. How emotionally attached would you say you are to the stadium?

JK: When Fenway Park is alive, I feel extremely attached to it. During 2020, the ballgames were played in an empty stadium; they always felt lifeless, and I realized fully how much I depend (and thrive) on connecting with people. Now that fans are back in the stands, the joy is returning; it feels intimate even when it's 38,000 people, and I love that. Lots of people come to Fenway only once every few years or only once ever; it's extraordinarily gratifying to play even just a small role in helping create lasting memories for them.

RRX: Among all the things you do to keep the momentum up in a baseball game, you are known for

taking fan requests to play organ versions of popular music. This has to be daunting, since there are a million popular songs, and probably a million requests. What kind of song does a fan have the best shot of getting you to learn it? Any past favorites?

JK: It's *very* daunting, because every game is a new list of songs to learn and play on the fly, and there's always some that I've never heard before and others that I'm only slightly familiar with. I've gotten a lot better at the

ing and juggling all the requests, so though I've made the job much harder than it needs to be, I've also made it more fun than it otherwise ever could have been, and I get fantastic insights on what people want to hear, including plenty of stuff I never would've thought of. And I love that kind of direct interaction with fans and how I'm playing a song for everyone but also playing it for that one person who asked to hear it. There're too many favorite requests to name (or even remember). I've probably played over 5,000 in the past decade. The songs I'm most drawn to are the ones that have a catchy melody, an interesting structure, and a personal story behind the request from the person submitting it.

process of learn-

RRX: Being the music of the moment, there's a good bet that you're called regularly to punctuate great plays, solid at-bats, unbelievable catches. But you have a job to do, and you're probably too busy helping to make moments to actually experience them. Have you ever watched great games later on ESPN or something to see it like a fan?



JK: No, but when there's an exceptional play, I make a mental note to watch the highlight later when I can savor it without having to be thinking about what I'm doing next. And when also play keyboards for super-group there's a big win, I check in with my colleagues after the fans have filed out so I can appreciate those moments in a more fan-like capacity.

RRX: I'm willing to bet that very few people know what the organ room looks like. People may have images of Phantom of the Opera, with a little hunchback of Notre Dame mixed in, but they don't know. For you, it's a place you spend hours a day in, creating some pretty magical stuff. Can you describe it to us?

JK: It's very unglamorous. It's a cramped and somewhat hidden space, and the organ and I are surrounded by necessary wiring, monitors, lights, clocks, notes, a headset, and a laptop, but the sound that reaches the ballpark seating bowl from that little cubby hole is good.

RRX: Just like your working area, the Fenway organ is an instrument that few people have seen in its entirely; maybe no one has seen it in its entirety. It has not only power and history, but a little mysticism. Yet it is an instrument. How is the Fenway organ like other organs, and how is it different? Is it just bigger, or is there something else?

JK: It's a 1995 Yamaha Electone AR-100. No two organ models are alike, so as with any model, it takes a little time to get comfortable with it, but at this point, I know my way around it and know what I need from it, so I've been able to tweak it to where it gives me the most control and the best result I can get. I've always liked the model a lot, partly because it's what I've gotten so used to, and partly because it's well-suited for the gig. I enjoy showing it to people at the ballgames who express an interest in seeing it or who have questions about it. I end up

meeting a lot of other organists that way and learning from them about models that they use.

RRX: In addition to Fenway, you The Split Squad. And it seems that things are looking up as far as every-

one being able to go out and take in sweet music. Where are you all trying to play out this year? Do you have your eye on any spots? And what new songs are you packing for the

trip? JK: Our new LP will be out soon, and we're really pleased with how it's turned out, so we'll have lots of fresh material there to draw from for live shows. Things are still a little up in the air as far as exactly when it'll be safe and comfortable to pack clubs again, but we're tentatively/optimistically eyeing at least a couple dates in the mid-Atlantic US in early October,

prior to the

pandemic, we'll be looking for opportunities around the Northeast US (where three of us live and the other two visit regularly) as well as other parts of the US and in Western Europe. We always have a great time

when we get a chance to tour, and I feel like I've gotten my Rock Ph.D. from my four professor bandmates.

Local Horizons, Local Hopes

Jim Murphy has weathered many storms in the media industry, and he sees land in the distance.

BY DICK BEACH

Jim Murphy is the Director of Marketing and Corporate Relations for the Proctors Collaborative. He's agreed to answer some questions about the arts, the past year and who knows what else. Thanks for joining.

RRX: Today, you are mostly known for your work in the not for profit world. However, you have a career that also includes for profit media. What was it that lead you to move from the commercial world to, now, a Director at a large Arts Organization?

JM: I was in newspaper journalism most of my career and at some point had decided I wanted to find a path to become publisher at a daily. I worked my way up — newsroom, online operations, advertising sales leadership positions — locally and nationally — and eventually I became a publisher. Murphy's law: I became a publisher at the very start of last recession. The decline of the newspaper business had been underway for a time but the newspaper companies accelerated the process during a recession: hedge funds bought everything and squeezed revenue to recoup their investments. I managed three different newspaper groups at different times — over 60 publications in 30 communities in New York and Illinois mostly, with a couple small expression and recession.

Pennsylvania properties. The jobs were brutal – cutting expenses and reducing workforce constantly. I had several newspapers publishing five to six times a week with newsroom staffs of two or three. I had a daily newspaper in Illinois that reached less than 5 percent of households in their core market and when I looked at why – they had spent literally zero dollars on circulation promotion for several years and before that, very little. So, I briefly took a newspaper job in the Capital Region with the goal of exiting the industry, and then the Proctors opportunity came along. The attitudes and focus of growing an organization versus squeezing blood from stone couldn't have been different. I've been at Proctors Collaborative five and a half years now. I have to add, for decades most community newspapers were locally owned before they started getting sold to chains by second and third generation owners. I am hopeful someday that the tide will turn, and local ownership will return. It may not be in printed form but community journalism is essential to the health of America.





past year has been a challenge for everyone. The arts have taken a hit, not only in terms of venues, but also the artists. First let's delve into the venue side first. What would you consider the three most challenging parts of the last year from the venue side and why?

JM: First, keeping the venue structures viable – it takes a lot of money keep these buildings operating plus investments had to be made to upgrade things like air filtration before reopening. Two, it's people. It was hard to see so many talented people be let go, and yet we had to find resources to fund salaries – albeit reduced – to have people to maintain the buildings, as well as to retain institutional memory needed to successfully reopen. I could name several other challenges but for a third I will go with maintaining morale for those who kept their jobs ... it was very hard to see so many colleagues go, to withstand the months of uncertainty and even today there is trepidation about how we reopen with greatly reduced staffing.

RRX: Let's turn that one around. What have your conversations been like with other promotors, artists and the like? Is there a theme other than the obvious economic issues?

JM: Safety is paramount ... having the right protocols backstage and throughout the house. Next to that is a discussion around reinvention. Now is the time to change the structure of how we create, cast and produce shows. Every show, every theatre is looking at diversity and inclusion from every angle and there are new organizations such as The Theater Leadership Project and Black Theater Coalition who are helping create roadmaps for the industry's

RRX: It is beginning to look like we will be able to have shows, whether it be musicals, plays, rock or small acoustic soon. Mounting a serious

RRX: There is no denying that this touring show of any kind is a major un- and titles will be announced soon. And early 2020 as the world was shutting dertaking and will not happen overnight. Some show casts, like the late Jim Steinman's Bat out of Hell production have been keeping their shops up on the material - how long do you believe it will be before those shows are available and what do you think will arrive first?

> **JM:** Concerts are already back in states that opened early and they will be here before you know it; there are new announcements every day. All signs are that Broadway tours will remount as summer turns to fall. Producers are trying to get NYC theaters open by mid-September and at the same time recast, remount and reschedule road shows. Having all of this start-up activity happen all at once is unprecedented. We've already announced Proctors' first show is SUM-MER: The Donna Summer Musical in December. Capital Repertory Theatre will mount productions this year; dates

we'll have a busy second half of the vear at Universal Preservation Hall; announcements there soon, too.

RRX: On a completely different topic - you are the co-owner Craft on Wheels. You have a '57 Ford F-100 customized with six taps and a cooler, pouring craft beverages at events. Anything custom of that vintage is a labor of love. Please tell us about that a bit.

JM: My daughter Erin brought me the idea. Two things appealed to me: For one, I always harbored the interest of going into the restaurant/bar business and this, while hardly the same thing, was way to get into the hospitality world with little risk. Two, I wasn't going to pass up an opportunity to work with my daughter; she is finishing up grad school now to become a physician's assistant. No way she is going to ask me to going into the healthcare field with her (laughs) so this was the chance to work with her. We launched

down - Murphy's Law again - so the first year was a bust but things are going nicely now.

RRX: Thanks Jim - finally, as is my habit - are there any final words

you have that you would like to be remembered for - a message, a

thought? Something you believe is important.

JM: Support local music! Support local art! Support local!

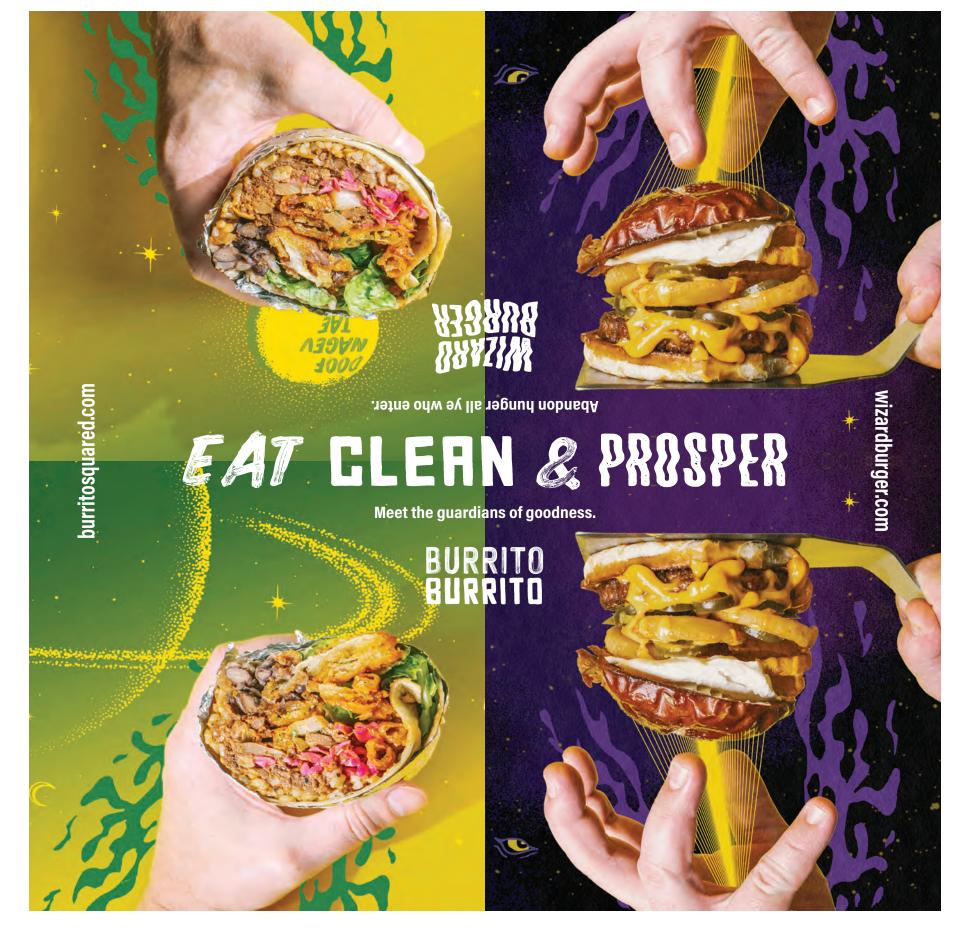
KC: It was certainly an honor to

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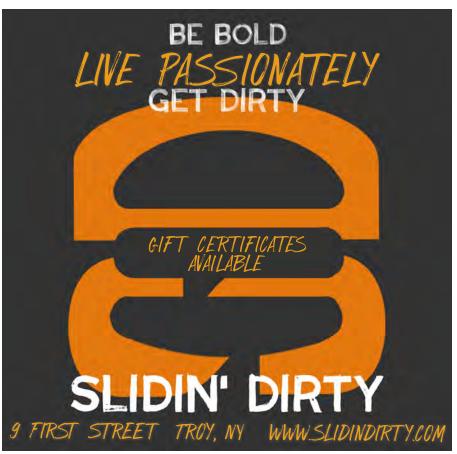
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A Man, His Dog, and Their Band



ick Santos is the talented voice behind his up-and-coming project Lily, with music that's been given as much love as the dog it shares a name with. Santos writes in to talk about his debut album Honesty Hour, the future of the scene, and what making music means to him.

RRX: Tell me a bit about your project. I understand you also play in Lemon of Choice, however, the focus of this band seems to be more focused on lyrics and a more atmospheric sound (from what I've heard, correct me if I'm wrong), is this an accurate interpretation?

NS: You're definitely right about Lily being more focused on lyrics. I spend a lot of time trying to make sure my lyrics make sense and can convey certain thoughts or feelings. A lot of the lyrics are written from a pretty autobiographical standpoint and many of the songs are related to pretty strong feelings about things I tend to not

discuss outside of the music. That being said, the music is pretty close to me and is a lot more serious compared to the Lemon material. Joe and Dan tend to focus more on the music then put some lyrics over them. It's pretty interesting to hear you describe the music as atmospheric though. I certainly don't think you're wrong, especially looking back at how much background noise is featured on the album. I mean the first track off the album ends with like fifteen voice memos and audio pulled from videos from my phone all played at the same time. Plus, like half the songs have some sort of layered feedback tracks. When I wrote the songs though I guess it never was an intentional atmosphere created. Honestly, though, I'm still trying to figure out the sound of Lily. When I first began writing the album the songs were more based around trying to sound like Microwave. There's also a lot of acoustic singer-songwriter influence

on some songs. I've even heard some I said, definitely less responsibility. songs being described as twangy alt-country. I think the overall sound will figure itself out over time, and can always be subject to change. I guess the main goal of Lily for me right now is just to write genuine songs that people can relate to. If I don't believe what I'm singing though I can't really expect others to either.

RRX: How does it feel working in both contexts? What is the difference to you between working on a LoC song and a Lily song?

NS: Working in both contexts is a blast just because the projects are so different. There's a lot less responsibility on my part when it comes to LoC. Dan and Joe write all the songs then bring them to Sam and me. Sometimes they write the bass part sometimes they don't, but my whole job in that band is to just show up and play the bass. I don't really handle any of the business or back-end of that band so as

Lily on the other hand is the complete opposite. I write all the songs and bring them to the other three. I make all the artwork and handle all the back-end work and the other three get to just show up and play. I enjoy a lot of that extra stuff no one really talks about with bands. Even though I fronted groups in high school, I didn't have a project like that until my third year of college. Having the low stakes part in LoC though made me take for granted a lot of the like social aspect. I remember driving to the first Lily show with Joe and about halfway there I was like "oh shit I have to like... talk to people and do the thing."

RRX: Is the project name/ project itself conceptual at all? I'm assuming Lily is the dog used in art and in a lot of your pictures.

NS: No, it's not really conceptual. I wish there was more to it, but I just liked the name! Lily is the name of my

Those two programs did show up and support a lot of the local scene though. Not having that extra group of people interested in music may somewhat affect the turnout at least for a little bit in the college DIY scene.
