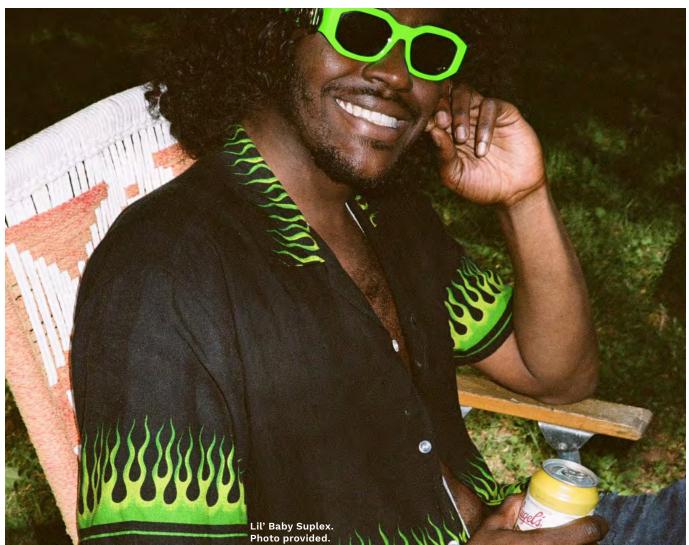

LBS: Well, I like to be around people who can blend with any group so I would say my homies are a part of a whole bunch of different scenes and we can really make any scene our own. that's what we're bringing to the game and that's what we're doing everywhere we go and people reciprocate that energy every time.

RRX: As I said in one of the previtry to pick a side on it and I'm not try- ous questions, you don't hold back. You rap about drugs, you rap about guns, and it's a part of life, it is what it is. But there are a lot of people who hear rap and hip hop and think it's a bad influence on people. Never mind that metal lyrics can be just as bad in different ways. What's good about the bad?

> **LBS:** People say that because they don't have to deal with it in their everyday life and they're scared of it cause they don't want it to effect their little bubble. Where I'm from we face that stuff head on and I feel like rap music in particular was always kind of similar to the news you hear what's going on it different cities around the world you hear the new slang and you're seeing the latest clothes in the videos so I feel like talking about the reality of what's going on outside is the least I can do. Otherwise, people who know me in real life would know it's fake. I feel like when you're doing anything artistic your environment plays a big part in how it comes out so you gotta let people know.

> **RRX:** This is where you answer the question I didn't ask. Remarks? Comments? Educate, enlighten, emote the floor is yours.

> LBS: Final Remarks: I really appreciate you guys for giving me this opportunity and showing me love on your platform. The questions you asked were sick I can tell you really care about what you do that made me more excited than I already was. I just want everyone seeing this to know I'm in a great space and I'm ready to make everyone who believed in me the last few years to know it's our time but I'll keep it short and sweet. 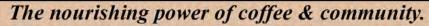

ara Rule has snowy white magic ferrets, slinky heart capturers that she uses to mesmerize her crowd on TikTok. She and her magic ferrets perform to an iPhone and if they're lucky, their adoring fans provide them with little satchels of coin, which Tik-Tok holds for safe keeping.

Then one day, the lights went out as Tara found herself on the wrong end of a permanent ban.

TikTok, with close to one billion monthly users and three billion app

downloads, is well on its way to being the victor of the battle for social media dominance in the 21st century. But with a content moderation system drive almost exclusively by AI, it is also in a different battle, in the Mexican standoff of art, cyberbullying, and automation.

TikTok was launched in 2017 as a platform that allows for the creation and sharing of short videos, anything from 15 seconds to 10 minutes. It has had a meteoric rise, penetrating one

third of the social media market in one-third the time of Facebook and Ina younger generation of users.

On one side of the battle are artists, musicians, performers, and other creative folk, who find in sites like TikTok a way to support themselves by making what people want to see and hoping something goes viral that they can capitalize on. TikTok provides them a platform, and a way to make money off their content, holding said money in necticut. Her videos, ferrets and no

TikTok's own system, with additional incentives in a "Content Creator's stagram. And it is a definite favorite of Fund." On another side of the battle is, surprisingly, not TikTok, but rather, its almost exclusive reliance on AI to moderate user content, including creators'

> Tara Rule, in person, is a bubbly, excited, and enthusiastic person, a filmmaker and actress. And her ferrets have doctorates in applied physics and economics from the University of Con-



passion and drive on her sleeve. In no way does she tread the line of public decency but faced the darkness for one error and one error only; one of her posts went viral.

When a post goes viral, it's the break every content creator looks for. It's the lottery. Its where actual money starts coming in. And TikTok, through its monetizing tools, can efficiently keep track of this money. Most content creators simply leave it in TikTok's accounts. Tara did. So, when content gets banned, and with it, the accounts themselves, content creators get locked out of everything, including their earnings.

One of Tara Rule's videos went viral. And with all the joy and the praise and the accolades came just a little bit of hate.

"I only started making content on TikTok a few months ago," says Tara. "I was slowly gaining a small following, with a few videos going somewhat viral here and there, (2-3 million interactions). I recently made a dance video with my ferrets that exploded overnight with 30 million interactions. I was gaining tens of thousands of followers per minute. The video has gone viral on all social media platforms and has been featured on several shows about animals and viral videos. Just like with any social media platform, becoming an overnight viral sensation is asking for bullies to come out of the woodwork."

Not by people she knew; well, there's actually no way to tell. And there's no way to tell how many users reported her, who reported her, how many of them were real accounts, or what about her content was report worthy. It may be that TikTok's AI sees a quantity of reports and bans the user without any human inspection. Tara believes this may have been the case with her.

"Oftentimes, like in my experience,"

ferrets, are playful yet earnest, her Rule says, "one or two people will make a few fake accounts, report a creator's account using fake accounts, and just like that they have successfully taken someone down in a pretty cowardice way if you ask me. They get what they want, which is to inconvenience someone for a few minutes, without having to face any potential repercussions themselves.'

> This article could be solely about cyberbullying. The reason it's not is because what we call 'content' used to be called 'art,' or 'creative expression,' and that will draw criticism. For any social media platform to generate artistic expression, it must moderate that expression in the way that it is being perceived - through human eyes. AL will never be able to understand or appreciate art, no matter how many Picassos it can fabricate.

> Rule did try to contact TikTok to inquire into the banning, but it was a brick wall. This journalist reached out to TikTok and has not received an answer as of this writing. This is not unique to TikTok, and to a degree, it's understandable. With a billion active users, it would be very difficult to respond to the needs of even a fraction of them. This is why it's doubly important that the moderation of content, especially reported content, be flagged for inspection before banned. That is the challenge for Tik-Tok, and for other social media platforms in the 21st century.

Tara Rule's account was reinstated, She got hit, and she got hit hard. possibly due to a flood of media inquiries. It would be the hope that Tara had learned a hard lesson on how not to be banned, but sadly, her ferrets cannot get any cuter; they are already too cute. Yet she stands at the ready for the next viral video, the next wave of bullies. And she'll likely not keep much of her earnings in the TikTok kitty.

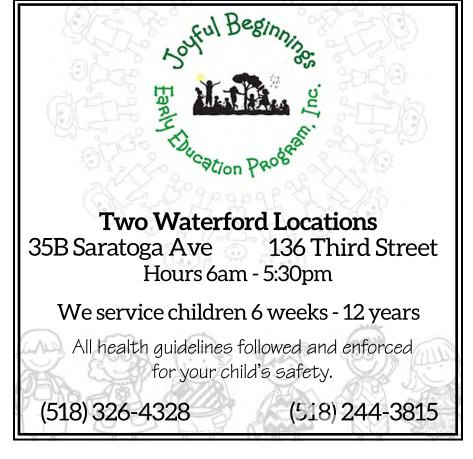

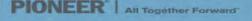

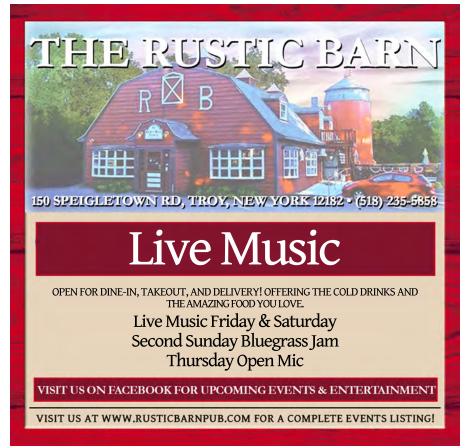

met Reggy Steel at the popular Rustic Barn open mic, and he caught my attention immediately with his confidence - a true artist. High-quality lyrics over well produced tracks, the heart of the crowd was captured, and everyone was grooving. Since I'm not afraid of talking to strangers, I caught him out on the back deck where the overflow crowd was socializing, and we became fast friends. I learned about his new album and his experience with rap, and I couldn't resist learning more about what he's up to.

RRX: As soon as I saw you perform at the Rustic Barn, I could tell you are in a great place with your music. You have a ton of songs on social media,

and your new album "Return of the Servant" was just released May 2022. The eponymous first track is about returning to your faith. What brought you there? And why did you decide to lead with that message on your

RS: For me, I grew up in church. My parents put that foundation in me, and so it's a big part of who I am. God has always been a big part of my life. With me being older, and having kids and doing my music, I think it's important to share my faith.

You know, none of us are perfect. We all make mistakes. We all have our issues. But at the end of the day, I al-

get us through, whatever we're going through. And sometimes we forget that. Sometimes I forget that. So, me returning back to God, it's not so much that I ever left. It's just that dealing with work, having kids, doing music, sometimes you get so caught up with other things you forget to say that prayer. So basically, "Return of the Servant" is giving my attention back to God.

RRX: I'm always interested when I run into people I haven't met before in the local music scene. How long have you been here, and what has it been like for you?

RS: I'm from Virginia, born and

out of Newport News, VA and sometimes the government will send a lot of the workers to other areas to help with other naval facilities. But my main hub is back in VA. But I've been here in NY working for a while out of this naval site. So that's part of my job. Sometimes I have to go to other naval yards to help out.

about how to write a good rap song, and it sounds like one basic step is learning how to write and rhyme over beats. But you talk about storytelling as essential for producing a captivating song. Once you mentioned that, I noticed the importance of that part of the creative process. This crosses over multiple genres. On a previous release, your song "Soul Mate" tells a romantic story. How do you think storytelling helps people connect with your music?

RS: One of the key components is storytelling. This is why country music is so popular, because a lot of country music tells stories, which is why it's a popular genre. So hip hop, when you tell stories, it causes people to listen and dig deep into the song. And think about the type of shows that we watch on Netflix or Hulu, our minds are drawn to suspense. We're drawn to climax. We're drawn to twists and turns. Because we always want to know what the surprise is. We always want to know what's behind that wall.

RRX: That ties into one of the songs you suggested I check out. "Wet Dreams" by J. Cole. I saw the title, and was like, is this going to be racy? But it was actually a very sweet, romantic at it. Just keep at it. story about first love. A great surprise.

RS: I see what you're saying about my song "Soul Mate" and the song by J. Cole. These are key components that we like to talk about. Think about some of the greatest movies you've ever seen, they have action. They have storytelling. Plots, twists and turns that you streaming and social media sites! don't expect. And then of course, there's always some love scenes in it. The guy gets the girl, or the girl gets the guy in the end. Those are key components.

RRX: Let's show some love for the female side of rap. I'm so old "Push It" was a big hit at my middle school dance. Who should I listen to so I can update my playlist?

RS: Yeah, that's definitely old RRX: I asked you a lot of questions school. LOL. Check out Young M.A. Cardi B, and Snow Tha Project.

> **RRX:** Wow – those were all uniquely awesome. I'm glad to see the women are out there representing strong! I especially dig the raw honesty of Young M.A. and the friendly vibes of the Snow Tha Product track. One of the things I love about rap is the honesty involved in the lyrics.

> RS: Yes - it's the skills! It really comes over time. The more you write and the more you rap to a beat, you'll learn how to find different syllables. The thing to worry about is getting the basics down first. The delivery, the timing of the words, how to write a beat. Work on the basics, and then rapping fast and using different methods of rapping, that's something that will come naturally over time.

ark Foster has been a staple of the local music scene forever. As a member of the Grammy winning Albany Symphony Orchestra for over 40 years, he has performed at Carnegie Hall and The Kennedy Center, and has recorded over two dozen albums. Mark has performed several seasons with the how you came to discover the drums. Williamstown Theater Festival and has performed in Moscow and Jordan with the New York State Theater Institute. Mark is a music professor at RPI, The College of St. Rose, and he is the co-conductor of the Empire State Youth Percussion Ensemble. Mark does it all, from classical to jazz to rock drums. He is a true master of his craft, and has performed with Stewart Copeland, Ringo Starr, Levon Helm, Aretha Franklin, Wanda Jackson, and countless others. When I decided to begin drumming at the age of eight, my father asked around; "Who should my son take lessons with"? The answer, inevitably, was Mark Foster. I studied with Mark for several years in middle school and high

school. As a new student, I was in awe of his talents and abilities. Over 40 years later, I am still in awe. Mark is patient, kind, knowledgeable and a fantastic person. So please welcome, Mark

RRX: Hi Mark! Welcome. Tell us

MF: My first kit was a toy kit with cardboard heads for Christmas. It had a big rainbow on the bass drum head, at the age of four. In fourth grade my family moved to the other end of the block, where a neighborhood dad played drums on the weekend. His son had a garage band, and I would go over and check them out. This was around the same time as The Beatles and the whole British invasion was happening and was a great time for music in general.

RRX: Who are some of your earliest influences?

MF: The British Invasion was the biggest early influence; Ringo, Dave Clark, actually Bobby Graham played on those records and with a lot of the

other British bands, Ginger Baker, then the Allman Brothers, and I listened to a lot of Zappa. My cousin had Freak Out right when it came out. Then I got into jazz, mostly CTI (Creed Taylor Incorporated) stuff, some Blue Note, Mahavishnu, Chick, Herbie, etc., so for drummers it was Cobham, Harvey Mason, Steve Gadd, Jack DeJohnette, Lenny White, and I especially loved what Aynsley Dunbar did with Zappa. But Tony and Elvin were so deep. My dad bought me "Emergency!" for my birthday in 1970, but it took me several years of listening to appreciate that album. Coltrane's "Crescent" and Wayne Shorter's "Speak No Evil" were so elegant. I should say that the immersive experience of music is what drew me to my enjoyment and involvement in music versus banging on the drums or identifying with a certain other instruments? style. I really got that from listening to my older brother and sister's records. That connection with an age just before I was born and various locations; NYC, Detroit, the West Coast continues to be

intriguing. The classic reverb that Columbia used for the Johnny Mathis records, The wall of The Bitter End on the cover of Peter, Paul, and Mary. Everything from Motown. The Beach Boys from "Help Me Rhonda" to "The Warmth Of The Sun".

RRX: Were your parents in favor of your decision to pursue drumming as a

MF: Well, the «decision» took place in stages; they supported my Eastman degree and understood that the career thing is not as direct as most jobs, but they had me take some civil service tests as a fall back. They came to appreciate all aspects including rock bands, symphonic, and teaching as part of the package.

RRX: Certainly. Do you play any

MF: Not professionally. I have functional piano skills and learned the basics on many instruments in college. I took a few years of piano lessons from Sister Annette Covatta from grades

RRX: As a percussionist, you can play it all, from snare drum to tympani to mallet percussion and drum set. What is your favorite thing to play?

MF: Drum set is still the most fun. Mallets and percussion (conga, shakers, etc.) can also be just as fun, but largely a different function musically. And it>s a lot more pleasurable in the morning to be playing something on vibes or marimba versus the drum set.

RRX: Do you have a favorite or least favorite gig?

MF: I can't really say. Every gig is a combination of how I played, everyone else's contribution, and the vibe in the room. All of that can change over the course of the night, and then your perception can change, even days after the Frank Zappa fan. Care to comment on gig. Sometimes a gig is very stressful as you prepare and in performance but rewarding in the end. Other gigs are easy or fun, but after a while can be somewhat unfulfilling. If there's a balance, you don't necessarily rate each one, you know?

RRX: I do. Do you ever play double bass?

MF: Quick answer, no. But I have a double pedal. I don't even remember why I got it- I might have been trying some options working through covering some programmed parts. I never really listen to or play music with a double kick, except Cream or Cobham. It never really clicked with me.

RRX: Tell me about working with Stewart Copeland.

MF: I think that David Alan Miller and Stewart shared the same publicist or something- I may have that wrong, but Stewart was putting together what became the "Orchestralli" project and we did both full orchestra and the smaller Dogs ensemble if I recall correctly. He used one of these pieces when he did the drum set feature on Letterman. It had to cost a bundle for Stewart because we were all hired at full rate,

unit. Everyone had headphones, it was all synced to the computer. I believe it got bogged down in the process to mix it live from the very live Troy Music Hall, but harder to edit with all that sound and so many variables. They built his drum riser in the middle of the hall over the seats, which was very cool. It was fun to tell him about first meeting him when The Police played the Hullabaloo. I was able to get into the back room after the gig thanks to Todd Nelson. (Stewart's brother ran the record company that Fear of Strangers signed to). That was a memorable night; the first time that I, along with The Police, met the infamous leopard. I understand Sting was pretty freaked out about that.

RRX: I understand that your a the various drummers of Zappa?

MF: I saw Zappa at Smith College in '71. It was around the "200 Motels", "Fillmore East". "Just Another Band from LA" era and it was simply a great concert in every way. Aynsley (Dunbar) was playing Hayman drums and got a very unique sound. He had a loose feel while nailing all of Zappa's figures.

Of the earlier era stuff, I really liked "Burnt Weenie Sandwich" and "Uncle Meat", and a large part of that was the writing and Ruth's (Underwood) mallet and percussion stuff. And later with "Roxy" "Apostrophe", and where" had a lot of cool songs and arrangements. The combination of Ralph Humphrey and Chester Thompson worked especially well. I had a chance to talk to Aynsley when he was with Journey and they did a free concert at SPAC. I could tell that he felt that Ralph (Humphrey) was able to navigate the charts and direction more to Frank's liking. Ralph was good, but it was only when they added Chester that the groove got more interesting. Although I wouldn't compare the styles, that's why Butch (Trucks) and Jaimoe sounded so together with the Allman

came lighter. The two drummer thing is interesting to me. A lot more interesting than the NO drummer thing which seems to be more common these days! I have done the two drummer thing several times; with Malcolm Travis and Ted Were and with Al Kash later on, all with incarnations of bands with Rick Bedrosian. I also did a fun multi-drum thing that Mike Benedict put on for a few years. The Monday night hang with Family Tree at Putnam place every Monday works so well. Chad and Steve, as well as everyone else, always sound great. Anyone who sits in immediately fits in well. They keep it open, but it never, ever descends into a bad version of open mic night.

Back to Zappa! Of course, Terry Bozio and Vinnie Colaiuta and Chad Wackerman were all incredible, but I didn't like the music as much from that era. I saw Zappa with Vinnie at the Palace. Vinnie was set up on the side up front so you could see him at all times. It was amazing, but not really musically memorable to me.

RRX: Nice! Ok, now some fun stuff. Do you own rototoms? Concert Toms? Electronic drums, or a cocktail

MF: Roto>s! I have a billion rototoms, including a set that Sarah Ayers gave me that were Sarge's, but have never used a single one with a drum set. There's a lot of symphonic writing where they're used - sometimes with as a performer, composer, or teacher? specific pitches and tuning within the piece. I sometimes teach tympani using a pair of larger sized pedal ones I got from Mike Demarco. So having all those sizes is useful. A few were even used this past weekend for the symphony. Concert Toms? No, and ironically more often these days double headed toms are preferred. Again, the symphony needed seven this past weekend, all double headed. Electronics, Drumkat, Malletkat, triggers and modules; never did a pad kit or Simmons. I picked up

the Yamaha EAD that mounts to the kick and connects to the module. Electronics seem to be best when it supplements real stuff, and best when it's just a few things vs. a real complicated interconnected monster. Cocktail kit? No, I've played them occasionally. Too many compromises with the sound. It can be a cool look, and I get that.

RRX: If you weren>t a drummer, what would you be doing? Have you had another career?

MF: I have had various summer jobs and the like. I was able to function ok whatever it was, but really not only prefer anything I've done with music; teaching as well as performing directly, but to me the hang with the creative community is just as important as the work itself.

RRX: What are some of your other hobbies, interests or passions?

MF: There-s so much to music, that pretty much trumps anything else. I enjoy going for walks, comedy shows or some political stuff like a good columnist or an SNL sketch. going to Mass Moca or a good restaurant. Pretty normal stuff. I was never interested in history as a subject but continue to be fascinated to learn about local history and memories from older siblings about this area and other shared experiences. I just finished a book by John O'Hern, "Not the Kennedys", about growing up here which was great.

RRX: What are you most proud of

MF: Any bit of happiness and/or success of any of the students I've had some part in assisting through the years is always nice. Most of that success is through their work and talent, but if I've been able to provide any general or specific guidance, that is gratifying.

ime to geek out with some songs you've probably never heard. Most obscure, some were hits, all included for reasons which will be explained as we go along. Every one of Haywood's It's a double sider by The them can be found easily online. You should give them a spin at least once because life is too short to listen to music that sucks.

"Fight Fire" by The Golliwogs: Before they were Credence Clearwater Revival they were The Golliwogs. So what's in a name? Duh...they had hits as CCR. John Fogarty and the boys released several 45s on Fantasy Records before becoming CCR and this one is the best. It has the Creedence feel to it and Fogarty's vocal is in top form. This is included on the Pebbles box set, which is a must for all garage fans.

"White Lies and Blue Eyes" by Bullet: Hey, it's a hit! Went top 20 in the Fall of 1971. Often cited as one of the first power pop records. Probably the first power pop U.S. hit as the great Badfinger from England was also kicking out power pop around that time. Dig that horn arrangement! Songs like this were getting fewer and fewer as the charts were being overrun by the likes of The Carpenters, Bread and Olivia Newton John. No wonder we went from AM to FM....

"Captain Groovy and his Bubblegum Army" by Captain Groovy: This is the fully produced theme song to a cartoon that never happened, and I so wish it did. Who knows what it would have been about? Not me but I'll bet it would have been trippy. Released on the ill-fated Super K label about 1969ish, it is one of the heaviest bubblegum records ever. Full of fuzzy guitars,

massive organ and swirling riffs. Captain Groovy's gonna take you away. Yeah right, I wish....

"Hey Joe/Midnight Hour" by The Haywoods....yes, those Haywood's...as in Bo Donaldson and the ... as in "Billy Don't Be A Hero" AM gold. Not a great record by any stretch but still better than anything they made after they sold their soul to the company. Besides, you gotta respect a band that puts out a record of two of the most played tunes of the 60's. The band showed some respect to The Leaves by doing an arrangement of "Hey Joe" just like theirs. I never even knew about this record till I learned that Bo himself found a few copies kicking around his attic and he was selling them for 500 clams each. Hey Bo, what's the deal? Have the Billy royalties dried up already?

"Midnight Hour" by The Wanted: Now here's a version of "Midnight Hour" that's pretty damn cool. This Detroit band came up with their own intro and bridge that truly makes it their own. I've got quite a few versions of this classic, first done by Wilson Picket and it's become one of my favorites. I first found a nice scratchy copy, (I like scratchy, builds character), on A&M Records during one of my marathon crate digs down at Jimmy's shop on River Street. Big smiles came up when we slapped it on the turntable as this was a find! Looking it up, I found it was first released on Detroit Sound Records and even that copy was selling for Chicklets. In other words, it's a bonafide rare obscurity from 1966 that won't break the bank.

"In The Pines" by Tiny Tim: You

wanna talk strange? This is the one. I have no doubt you've heard Nirvana's version, which is commonly known as "Where Did You Sleep Last Night." Blues folks have also heard the magic 12-stringer fingers of Leadbelly belt out his haunting standard. But I guarantee you've never heard anything like Tim's version. A single acoustic guitar and Tiny's unmistakable vocal, kicks things off as it quickly swells into a "House of the Rising Sun" feel. The creepy organ solo is outstanding as Tim belts out the final lyrics then goes on to have a nervous breakdown as the organ drones. This song straddles the genres of blues and Southern Gothic. You come on

board thinking it's going to be a novelty song, but you'll come away with a whole different perspective. It's quite the feat from a cat who spent his life covering music from the Vaudeville era. Ironically, it's a serious song made by an artist nobody took seriously. Found this on a two CD compilation from Red Bird records. As if things couldn't get weirder. Now get out and hit the bins!

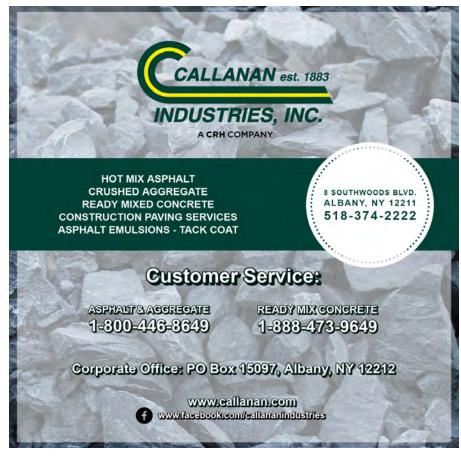

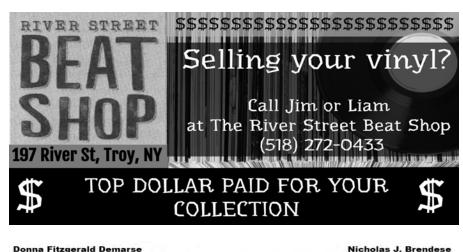

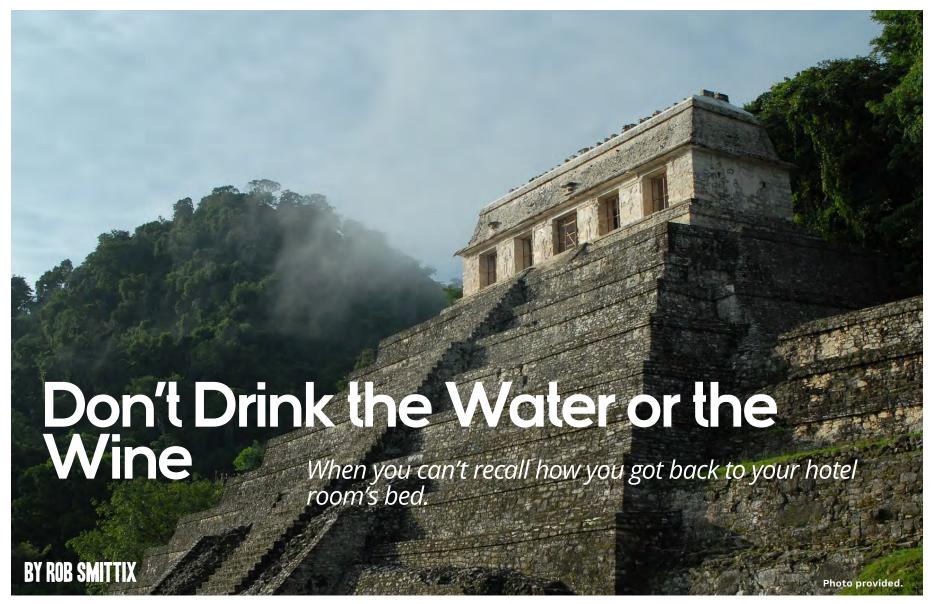

My buddy who is getting back into growing ordered the seeds he wants to grow - Durban Poison and DJ Short Blueberry - and they arrived with some some extra seeds, compliments of seller.

He decided to test his new grow tent set up with the free seeds. A systems test, if you will.

fluorescent four-foot T5's with a mixed spectrum and a full spectrum with violate or blue to mimic the spring sun for about 16 days before he moved them into bigger pots, changed the soil and changed the lights to 400-watt metal halide.

He changed the amount of light too. 24 hours of fluorescent light became 12 hours a day of 400-watt metal halide years to come. light, 12 hours a day of darkness.

"This tricks the plants into thinking begin to flower so I can determine the males from the females. It usually takes five days, but these took seven," he says. "They had five weeks of vegetative growth and one week of flowering when that growth ceased, so I could sex them."

At the end of the seven days he had four males and four females. The males were removed, and the four females went back to 24 hours of light, which now tricks them into thinking its spring again and puts them back into vegetative growth. They will stay in the one-gallon pots for two more weeks be-

Vegetative growth will continue for three to four weeks before he moves them back to 12 hours on, 12 hours off to start the flowering stage, which will go on for two to three months until they are ready to be harvested.

So far - the tent, fans, filters, and lights are working exactly like they should be. The test is a success.
